Cost of ID cards to go up

Registration board savs documents cost five times what people pay

he cost of acquiring national identity cards is likely to go up by 500 per cent if a proposal to increase the charges is approved, the Nation has learnt.

The current charges were way below the cost of production, according to the Coast coordinator of the National Registration Board (NRB), Mr George Opiyo.

Citing the replacement of identity cards

as an example, Mr Opiyo said it costs the Immigration ministry Sh500 to replace one but the applicant pays only Sh100.

we are operating at a loss when replac-ing either lost or mutilated ID cards as the material used is imported from Britain," said Mr Opiyo. He was speaking during the just-ended Public Service Week. The NRB proposes that the Govern-ment charges Sh500 for issuing duplicate.

ID cards and replacing old ones with the second generation type and \$\sh1,000\$, up from \$\sh300\$, to change information on ID cards. The only free service would be for new registrations.

Change image "Right now, we are accused of not raising revenue and we would like to change that image," Mr Opiyo said. Reacting to calls for exemption of chil-

dren of civil servants and teachers who come from areas close to international borders from being vetted before being issued with ID cards, Mr Opiyo said this was beyond his department's docket.

The law requires people living near in-

ternational borders such as Kwale, Taveta, Tana River and Lamu to be vetted before they are issued with ID cards.
"The role of NRB is to process applica-

tions only while the role of identification lies elsewhere," he said, adding that fingers had been pointed at the board for the "mistakes" of other departments.

SMS service

To achieve its target of issuing 8.6 million ID cards by 2012, Mr Opiyo said the board had proposed the computerisation of the

department.
"This will enable people to use the SMS

service to monitor progress in the processing of their ID cards," he said.

He said that the department planned to set up a network of 110 registration centres, replace 1.5 million ID cards with second expertation ones purphase 151 dies. second generation ones, purchase 151 digital cameras and renovate 71 registration offices countrywide.

Ministry set to reclaim illegally acquired land

The Government will repossess all ille-

The Government will repossess all ille-gally allocated land at the Coast, Lands minister James Orengo has said.
"We intend to reclaim the illegally dished out land. We will do that within the provisions in the law," said Mr Orengo who is accompanying President Kibaki in his tour of Coast Province.

The minister, who was speaking after opening a two-day workshop on the role of geo-information in national develop-ment, also disclosed that most of the country's northern boundaries were not clearly marked out.

Agricultural show

President Kibaki will later open the re-gion's Agricultural Show of Kenya. He is expected to address among other issues the growing calls by area MPs for coastals to be appointed to head key institutions including the Mombasa port.

On the country's mapping, the minister cited Eastern and North Eastern as areas that were not clearly mapped out.

This could jeopardise the border loca-tions with the neighbours.

The principal of the College of Architecture and Engineering at the University of Nairobi, Prof Francis Aduol, said the use of artificial reference surfaces to mapping could lead to border point




