Lid over State secrets could be removed

Ministry drafts policy to ease flow of information to the taxpayer

he public will access some of the Government's best kept secrets if new propos-als to declassify official doc-uments are passed into law. The Information and Communi-on ministry has drafted a policy ument on freeing government

nformation to be discussed in Parliament.

Yesterday, Information minister Mutahi Kagwe told a seminar in Nairobi that the State was commit-ted to ensure smooth flow of infor-mation between public officers and

taxpayers.
"The Government will enact a Freedom of Information Act to provide a roadmap of how citizens can gain

roadmap of how citizens can gain access to government information and instances where access can be denied," he said.

He went on: "Under the Act, public institutions will be required to produce any record on the request of any person, unless the institution are shown statutor, examption."

can show a statutory exemption."
Public officials are reluctant to give information to the public, often cit-ing the Official Secrets Act, a colonial

relic designed specifically to preserve State secrets and security. However, the drafters of the law did not outline which specific secrets related to State security, thus giving lee-way to civil servant to deny the public access to information.

The Official Secrets Act makes it an offence to use, for any purpose, prejudicial to the safety and interests of the country any code, word, plan article document or information that has been entrusted to a civil servant.

The laws have made access to gov-ernment documents by the public and media a nightmare as bureau-crats who do not wish to give infor-

mation cite the provisions.

Elsewhere, Nation Media Group chief executive Linus Gitahi said the fight for media freedom in Africa was on because some "rogue govern-ments" were clamping down on its independence.
"We have witnessed rogue govern-

ments clamp down on independent media curtailing one of the cornerstones of a democratic society," he

Magistrate to testify in fight over former MP's property .

An MP and a magistrate were yesterday summoned to appear before the High Court and testify in a dispute over administration of former Moyale MP Guracha Galgalo's estate.

High Court judge Lady Justice
Joyce Aluoch also ordered the Moyale Member of Parliament, Mr Wario
Malla Galgalo, a brother of the dead
MP, to appear in court on March 13
when the case will be heard.

Also required in court is a magistrate stationed in Limuru, Mr Abdul Raman Aminga and Nairobi Kadhi Almuhdhar Ahmed Hussein.

The judge made the order following an application by lawyer Alfred Nyandieka representing Dr Gu-racha's widow, Ms Bernadette Okotu

Mr Nyandieka told the court that the three had sworn affidavits and he wanted to question them. Ms Shama is involved in a legal dispute with Ms

Rehema Dida Jaldesa who is claiming to be Dr Guracha's wife.

Ms Jaldesa wants the court to re

Sh350m store for medicine to be built

A medical drugs depot will soon be built in Nairobi's Embakasi area at a cost of Sh350 million.

Wealth minister Charity Ngilu yes-terday said plans for the construction of the storage were at an "advanced

stage: "Currently, my ministry, through the Kenya Medical Supplies Agency, is spending hundreds of shillings in paying rents for hiring various ware-houses in Nairobi and other towns," said the minister.

Shortage of drugs Speaking in Nairobi, Mrs Ngilu said there were enough drugs in the coun-try and allayed fears of a shortage of anti-retroviral treatment.

"At the moment, we have enough ARVs to treat the 120,000 people on the life-prolonging drugs for the next

two years."

Mrs Ngilu was fielding questions from journalists during a fact-finding tour of the newly opened Kenya Medical Supplies Agency (Kemsa) depot on Mombasa road in Nairobi.

Kemsa's legal services manager, Mr Fred Wanyonyi said the 75,000sq feet depot currently stored drugs worth Sh4.8 billion.

Spacious depot

'Apart from the drugs, the facility is also able to store medical supplies such as gloves, syringes and hospital equipment due to its spacious size,"

Earlier the minister inaugurated the third Kemsa board which will be led by Mr Peter Kanyago.


The members of the board include director of Medical Services, Dr James Nyikal and Kemsa chief executive, Dr Charles Kandie among others.

Mr Kanyago appealed to the Health ministry to increase budgetary alloca-tion to Kemsa from the current Sh120 million to Sh400 million.

"This move is appropriate since the cost of operations fluctuates with the value and volume of medical com-modities handled," he said.

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
